Feb 7 BISG Sermon “Creating the Future” Rev. Kathy S. Sage

What kind of a future are you working toward? What are you reading about, discussing with others, and joining with others to create change in your community and beyond? Does change come from “cohesive social unity” or from a vigorous discussion of differences? We’ll explore such ideas from a book, “Heresy and Authority in Medieval Europe” which notes that heresy in Greek is haeresis and in Latin is “electio” (choice).

Bridget Doherty, who works for the Sisters of Providence in the Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation department will be speaking on the topic of saving Canada’s remaining six prison farms and why it is important for all Canadians that these farms are preserved. Can anything be done at this time to overcome public indifference on this issue? If possible we’ll hold a forum or at least an extended Community Response as follow-up to the two times we have explored this issue.

Sage Musings

The deadline for this KUFLinks came the day after the earthquake that left Haiti's capital city in ruins. I've been to Managua, Nicaragua where years after their massive earthquake large sections of that impoverished Central American capital city remained empty lots -- never rebuilt. It was reported that so much of the hurricane aid went to the benefit of the few wealthy of the country that the Sandinista easily came to power not many years after that natural disaster.

One of the specific comments in the Canvass notes was Nora Parish's offer to share her knowledge about Haiti with RE (written months before this tragic event). Images show survivors overwhelmed by the circumstances of their lives and surrounded by death. How will they find the resources to cope with such a widespread tragedy? How does anyone find the courage to look to the future when surrounded by loss?

On CBC radio I heard an author, Rabbi Kushner share one of his favorite quotes from Victor Frankel, "We can't control what happens to us, but we can control our response to the events of our lives." I believe that such a determination to focus our minds on garnering our resources to "live into" what presents itself is one of the single most helpful resources we have.

We have many ways of responding generously to events far away and closer to home. December found

our "mitten tree" filled to the brim and the Katarokwi Native Friendship Centre has sent their thanks. North Kingston Centre asked us to help see that everyone had boots for the winter and we filled baskets with good used boots. January 1st at our Interfaith Service our offering of nearly \$700 went to help the Kingston "Grandmother Connection" meet the needs of AIDS orphans in Africa. The "reaching out" and connecting continues with the Jim Scott concert benefiting Urban Agriculture and soon with our annual Child Haven Auction and Fundraiser. Also boxes of books are being filled for the story book effort at Pittsburgh Institute. What I note with interest of course is what fun and goodwill is often generated in the many efforts that we take on at KUF. And a special thank you to Beth Pater for helping to connect the "interests" through the Board and out to everyone at KUF.

I look forward to discussions in February that help us think about what kinds of things we want to do at KUF. The Forward Planning Task Force heard your requests to become not only more "informed", but to be more actively engaged in shaping KUF into the kind of Unitarian Fellowship we want to be --- and become in the future. First "stop" in the process is Sunday morning at the World Café on February 21st. I look forward to seeing you then, and at other times at KUF in February.

Is This for Real?

In his book *Empire of Illusion: the End of Literacy and the Triumph of Spectacle*, Chris Hedges argues that spectacles and reality shows make people helpless. He points out that many so-called reality shows are actually unreality shows; that pornography is fake love. How many of us find ourselves stranded on an island with a few strangers, with the aim to fight with these people and throw them off the island? However, he argues that uncritical viewers of TV shows begin to imagine themselves as protagonists, thereby thoughtlessly giving themselves up to an illusory life. Thus they accept their status, losing any impetus to change their unsatisfactory lives or to improve society.

I can't think of a greater contrast than that between a typical TV reality show and a KUF service. There is real light and commitment in the chalice lighting, we all

participate in the songs, the joys and concerns put us in touch with the realities of life in the extreme, the centering music provides a time for personal reflection, the offering lets us gauge our commitment, the sermon provides a new or different view of a topic, the congregational response lets us put what we have heard in another context and helps us remember it, and the holding of hands at the closing exemplifies our connection with others. Altogether, the service is rich in authenticity. And social action on the part of individuals or KUF as a whole is proof that lethargy and bland acceptance have not taken hold.

In his book, Hedges goes on to point out that illusion is pervasive in many of the claims of celebrities, of politicians, of advertisers and corporations. He writes that in addition to authentic experience, literacy and a respect for the sacred are means to prevent victimization by illusion and unreality.

Planning KUF's Future

KUF's future was the focus of a congregational meeting in late November. From the meeting and input from the survey which followed, the Forward Planning Task Force (FPTF) and the board realized that there needs to be more opportunity for members to take part in the planning for KUF's future. At the board meeting, a World Café event was suggested as a good way to address the situation. FPTF picked up the idea enthusiastically and extended it.

At a World Café, a number of small tables are set up. Each of the 4 or 5 people at a given table has a chance to comment on a question, and after 10 minutes or so, everyone except the person designated as that table's "reporter" moves on to other tables with related

questions. With the new group, the reporter summarizes comments to date and invites further discussion of the question. By this process, each question is expanded by answers and comments from many people and each participant benefits from the views of others.

The FPTF recommends that there be three or four World Café events over the next two or three months. By arranging them for different days of the week or different times of day, all members and friends should be able to participate in one or more. Kathy suggested that the first World Café event could be part of the service on Sunday February 21st.

At the first event, questions such as "Does KUF Need to Grow?" will be discussed.

Survey Results

Thirty-nine people responded to the survey initiated at the congregational meeting on Nov 30th. Many responders offered comments and also checked off the short answer items. In fact, the comments run to six typed pages, too many to make copies for all who may be interested. However, there are several ways to see the results. A basket at the information table holds several copies for you to read while you are at KUF. Another alternative is to request an email copy of the results by putting your name and email address on the sign-up sheet at KUF. You also can email kufpres@kingston.net and ask for an email copy.

Canvass Update

“Growing a Community of Openness,” the canvass campaign for 2010, has successfully ended with a total of \$95,045 in pledges. With the addition of \$7,848 from the Boost Campaign, the total pledged is \$102,893 (compared to last year's total pledge of about \$89,000). Thank you all for your wonderful generosity.

As we have continued to emphasize, however, the canvass is more than asking for financial support. It is an opportunity for KUF members and friends to make a connection and to engage in conversation about how we are doing and our future direction together. The canvassers received the comments you wished to have recorded, and we would like to share some of the highlights with you organized into themes:

Where We Meet

There were comments about the experience of meeting in our current location and opinions about a move to a larger space. Several of the comments clearly supported a new building, as exemplified by the following:

- “New building is important - lots of natural light; space to create magic; a children’s chapel.”
- “We need more meeting space; use upstairs but keep searching; move on the new building!”
- “We need space for R.E.”

Some of the support for the new building was given with a bit of trepidation, as reflected in the following:

- “We’re concerned about potential loss of members with another move and would like to see KUF take positive steps to bring KUFers together in a way that respects dissent.”
- “Get a bigger place but do not cut programs.”
- “The building is small but a new one is expensive.”

One individual was quite clear in his opposition to moving. He noted that there would be “no pledge until [he] knows the building plans.” Another person stated that she would support staying at 214 and using the apartment space. Still another was “curious about the use of the upstairs and the need for a new building.”

Others talked about our current location:

- “We’re concerned that we cannot afford the loss of rent from upstairs; the noise upstairs is disruptive.”
- “We need a sitting place after the service because if we sit down, we are not part of the conversation.”

- “I do not feel comfortable in the crowded space.”

Our Minister and the Services

As one might expect, there were a wide variety of opinions about the services; however, one item stood out: Nearly everyone who commented on the type of services noted how much they appreciated the January 1st interfaith service. One individual called it a “winner” and hoped it would continue. Others appreciated the choir and music, as well as the candles. Although four individuals critiqued the quality of the sermons, most comments were strongly supportive of the minister’s work and some noted an improvement in sermons.

Other comments spoke more generally in appreciation for her work:

- “Kathy’s services are greatly improving.”
- “Kathy has been great.”
- “Kathy is so wonderful and caring.”
- “I find Kathy a source of inspiration.”
- “We think Kathy gives exceptional leadership.”
- “Strong sermons from Kathy.”

There was some recognition, too, that a great deal is asked of Kathy and perhaps some of that effort needs to be shared.

Some individuals had specific suggestions for and comments about services:

- “More experimental services; more sense of sacred space.”
- “More ceremony or ritual at KUF would enhance the services. Traditions such as holding hands at the end while singing a simple closing song, possibly the same song every week.”
- “Enjoy BISG discussion groups and find the social justice aspects of sermons important.”
- “The discussion period should be longer and we should have a variety of service leaders.”
- “Really liked the January interdenominational service.”
- “Really enjoy most of the guest speakers.”
- “Enjoy the discussion after the service.”
- “There isn’t enough time for community response.”
- “Can we shorten the first part of the service and perhaps joys and concerns at the end of the service?”
- “More humanist material e.g. invited speakers (year of Darwin, etc.), science topics;
- “I would like to suggest a way to show financial support in our collection plate, something like a polished stone to represent a pledge paid by automatic debit or other types of payment.”

Our Community

There were a variety of comments about KUF. Most were appreciative and supportive of the community:

- “KUF is my community, family, a big part of my life.”
- “I feel KUF is very, very important because it provides a supportive community where one does not have to agree with strict, specific creed.”
- “Many people at KUF have been very kind to me as I have become old and have disabilities.”
- “Have always been a Unitarian and can't imagine another option.”
- “Enjoy listening to the service, children's story and music.”
- “I am generally very happy: Kathy is very approachable; children have enjoyed R.E.; I'm pleased about Amnesty International table and other practical social justice options.”
- “I look forward to growing KUF as a leading presence in Kingston and Eastern Ontario and I will help as I am able.”
- “I love the warm interaction and the ease of meeting people. I like the social justice info, the informality and the joys and concerns.”
- “I think volunteering is important.”
- One person suggested a quiet space for seniors.
- “Nobody tells us how to think at KUF which is good.”
- “The emphasis on young people is wonderful.”
- “Good discussions.”
- “People are really welcome.”
- “I enjoy newsletters and keeping in touch.”
- “For the next year, I would like to see people more relaxed.”
- “We need to make contact with our older members (longtime members), especially those who pledge but do not come.”
- “Community aspect is great.”
- “Coming together to talk about important issues.”
- “Spirituality.”
- “KUF being involved in issues that are important.”
- “Think of giving time as a donation.”
- “I value the helpful, caring community welcoming to those searching for a different faith.”
- “KUF encourages one to consider whether my actions are the best I can give.”
- “I like things the way they are.”
- “I enjoy receiving the newsletters and keeping in touch.”
- “I like the small size, informality, and community response.”
- “The atmosphere is warm and welcoming.”
- “Community is so important!”
- “KUF is known for its freedoms.”

- “Enjoy Sunday services and opportunities to meet and get to know more members through committees.”
- “The lack of dogma is great.”

Others described what they found important to their families:

- “I think the R.E. program is outstanding and I really wish we'd had this available when our daughter was younger.”
- One couple noted how they value R.E. and thought it could be broadened for the larger community.
- They valued the prospect of an all-faith community to learn from and valued all aspects of the program.
- They enjoyed special services like New Year's, the family sharing of Unirondack, and the OWL program.
- “I rely on R.E. for spiritual education for my children and I look forward to Unitarian rites of passage.”
- One comment indicated a desire for more volunteers for R.E., including some “non-parents” so the children's program would be more integrated.
- “Dave and Emily are wonderful for R.E.”

Nevertheless, there are areas that need attention:

- “KUF sometimes seems like an exclusive little club when it comes to major decisions.”
- “People who have concerns about particular policies/directions tend to be dismissed as negative cranks.”
- “The noise during coffee hour is a concern.”
- “I detect a certain smugness and self-satisfaction that comes through in the sermons and newsletter.”
- “Find coffee time too busy – I would like chairs set out and a quiet place.”
- When it comes to social action, the message seems to be that KUF members are all busy doing good works on their own particular causes so we don't need to do anything as a congregation (Child Haven being an obvious exception).
- One person noted feeling a “spiritual void” and not finding satisfaction at KUF. She feels that the services lack depth and suggested a reading group and some books, such as “Buddhist Book of the Dead.”
- “Can't get in much from the country to go to activities.”
- “It's hard to think we can do more, we are so busy already.”
- “Not enough people know about what KUF is about – we should use social networking tools.”

Thank you everyone for your comments, support, and time this past year.
