Connecting: Exploring This Month's Theme

Welcome to the practice of holding history. We begin this conversation with a reflection from Parker Palmer: It certainly seems the rabbis were right. Like those holy words, history in its fullness just sits there until our hearts

"Jewish teaching includes frequent reminders of the importance of a brokenopen heart, as in this Hasidic tale: A disciple asks the rebbe: "Why does Torah tell us to 'place these words upon your hearts'? Why does it not tell us to place these holy words in our hearts?" The rebbe answers: "It is because as we are, our hearts are closed, and we cannot place the holy words in our hearts. So we place them on top of our hearts. And there they stay until, one day, the heart breaks and the words fall in."

Our hearts are closed... this might seem a strange place to begin our month exploring the idea of Holding History. And yet, if we are being honest, we can see that defensiveness, protectiveness, and closed doors can rule our relationships far more than we might like to admit.

For instance, very few of us have a past without pain woven through it, and it can be easier to shut out those times than to confront them head on. But is that in the best interest of today? Or tomorrow? We are all well-versed in the game of sweeping old wounds under the rug, and invariably there comes a time when the rug must be lifted.

If we are to do this we need to remind ourselves of the relationship between history and vulnerability—without a heart willing to feel pain and endure grief, the fullness of our histories just can't enter in. Talking about past mistakes requires the ability to vulnerably say 'I'm sorry.' Telling your full story requires navigating grief over choices you wish you would have made differently.

It certainly seems the rabbis were right. Like those holy words, history in its fullness just sits there until our hearts break open and allows it in. So let's not just "remember" this month, let's not just talk of telling truthful tales, let's prepare to grieve, to feel, to share, and to release. The world needs our broken-open hearts, and so does our wonderful congregation.

The invitation is to spend some time exploring it in a deeper way than maybe you have before. So make time to ask yourself: Why have I held on to this memory for so long? Why has it been holding on to me? What is it trying to give me? Who helped me remember it? What piece of my current identity does it hold? What hunger does it represent? What wish is it wanting to rekindle?

As you engage with treasuring this memory perhaps find a picture of it, or create an image/piece of art/poem/etc.

which both signifies it for you and also celebrates it.


Deepening: A Contemplative Practice Experiment

Cook & Share a Piece of Your History

History isn't just held in our minds and memory. Often it's held in the food we eat, and the recipes shared with us. So this month reconnect with your history through the food you love and the food that loves you. You could:

- Find an old family recipe and prepare it. As you do, remember the stories connected with it, and perhaps find a way to share those stories online, in social media, or in conversation with others.
- -In a covid safe way, perhaps even virtually, plan a meal with a small circle of friends and have each of them prepare a favourite dish from a family recipe or from a tradition they hold. During dinner take turns sharing your stories.
- -Talk to a friend, family member, or elder in your community and ask them about family recipes or cultural foods they have loved. Then connect with them by making the recipe they give you or sharing a dish from your heritage.

And perhaps most important of all: whichever option you choose consider making it again someday when we can safely have potluck dinners again!



KUF Gathering To- gether – Updates!

In mid-October the provincial government lifted the capacity limits for places of worship when proof of vaccination is shown. The Board has decided to lift in-person limitations with the requirement of proof of vaccination. We will keep a secure record of proof of vaccination so you will only have to show it once. Tracking will still occur, but in the form of attendance. Masks are still mandatory at all times within the building.

For those still wishing for more distancing, a section of the main hall will have single chairs spread out.

Children are still asked to go straight to their floor for attendance and check in.

The Board is truly amazed at how marvelous the KUF community is. Over and over again, we hear about our members stepping up, filling in, helping out, and even how wonderful it is that you show up on Sunday mornings. This gathering of such amazing people, helps the Board fulfil our mandate of overseeing things.

Here are the monthly Board meeting things (or tidbits) that you might be interested in:

- * An application to the West Trust Grant for support of our UU principles was submitted, requesting help in covering the cost of flyers and posters to explain about Unitarianism and help with updating our website
- * Rev. Beckett and Cindy will be holding information and discussion sessions in November to look at the CUC motion for the 8th principle (see below). We have two delegates attending the Nov. 27th vote.
- * We have extended Sadie's contract for May and June 2022
- * Increasing the amounts paid to guest speakers to bring us inline with the CUC suggested rates
- * Canvass dates and goal set aiming for a balanced budget

The 8th Principle states: "We, the member congregations of the Canadian Unitarian Council, covenant to affirm and promote: Individual and communal action that accountably dismantles racism and systemic barriers to full inclusion in ourselves and our institutions."



Between the pre-sales online and the sales in person on Saturday, October 2nd, we were able to raise over \$16,000. Everyone chipped in with so many tasks: making donations, picking up donations, selling online, researching covid protocols, setting up, signage, organizing the goods, pricing, publicity, selling, security, being porters, talliers, and cashiers, hospitality, cleanup, and delivery of unsold goods. Give yourselves a big pat on the back!

We are also proud to let you know of the organizations that benefited from our unsold goods. Our volunteers delivered clothing to four different places: winter clothing went to In From the Cold Emergency Shelter and the Kingston Community Health Center while other clothing went to St. Vincent de Paul and the YGK Thrift Store, which supports Almost Home Kingston. Footwear was taken to Bioped Footcare & Orthotics. The Kingston Humane Society was the recipient for our pet supplies, towels, bedding and pillows. LCVI students received the backpacks for a project where they fill them with necessities for the needy. The rest of the items went to the Mission Thrift Store.
