Bruce Knotts was a Peace Corps Volunteer in Ethiopia (1972-75), worked for Raytheon in Saudi Arabia (1976-80) and on a World Bank contract in Somalia (1982-4), before he joined the Department of State as a U.S. diplomat in 1984. Bruce had diplomatic assignments in Greece, Zambia, India, Pakistan, Kenya, Sudan, Cote d'Ivoire and The Gambia, where he served as Deputy Chief of Mission. While in Cote d'Ivoire, Bruce served as the U.S. Government's Regional Refugee Coordinator for West Africa. Bruce worked closely with several United Nations Special Representatives and ob-

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served UN peacekeeping operations in Sierra Leone from 2000-2003. Bruce retired from the Foreign Service in 2007 and began directing the Unitarian Universalist Association Office at the United Nations (UU@UN) in 2008. Bruce founded faith-based advocacy for sexual orientation/gender identity human rights at the United Nations and continues to advocate for the rights of women, indigenous peoples and for sustainable development in moral terms of faith and values. Bruce is co-moderator of Religions for Peace, USA, a trustee of the Parliament of the World's Religions and a Commissioner for the Buddhist Tzu Chi Foundation. In 2006, Bruce and Isaac Humphrie were wed in Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada. Isaac works internationally as a lead producer for IMG Focus Productions at New York Fashion Week, an event environmentalist, a photographer, Connecting: Explorand a social media consultant.)

ing This Month's **Theme**

Pandemic time is teaching us so many things about relationships.

For some it has unraveled assumptions about work, calling into question the value of "going to the office." And it has also exposing how systems pass heavy burdens of economic suffering to those trapped in poverty and lower income brackets. And these times have revealed there is no possible replacement for in-person connection, and reminded us how precious human touch really is. And for some of us our friendships were even realigned when we were forced to prioritize those that are essential over those that are instrumental.

Virtual work also revealed how much "costuming" is required of us, not just making it clear how casual wear is much more comfortable than suits and other office wear, but also helping us notice how insidiously our "required costumes" rank us and separate us from each other. And there was space suddenly, in some of our lives, for the sacredness of unhurried habits, like sitdown dinners, dog walks, and making our own bread.

The promise and precariousness of the common good has been placed at centre stage, reminding us that when we all make small sacrifices for the larger interdependent web even a pandemic might end.

We've unlearned and learned all this because the pandemic brought so much to a necessary stop; it put on its brakes and gave us space for pause. We've had time to look around, to notice.

Maybe the most important learning during this time has been about cultivating relationships, and it then becomes a central lesson we can carry forward when we are able to move on from all this: go slow, take a look around, and notice.

We have a precious opportunity to carefully considered our relationship to speed, to consider a slower pace, to find a quieter way of moving and a more careful way of dancing with one another. It's a secret rarely mentioned and often overlooked: relationships are hard to build and nourish when we are running.

May this month help us hold on to relationships which are worth working towards. And may we all be blessed by the sacredness of moving at a snail's pace.

At Least Ten Reasons Why You Love Them

every once in a while. The precious people in our lives know we love, appreciate, and adore them. And it doesn't hurt for us to tell them exactly why that is so. There is something about saying it aloud that breathes life into our connections; there's something about giving voice to the reasons for our love that makes that love real.

This is what the poet, Matthew Olzmann, explores in his poem, Mountain Dew Commercial Disguised as a Love Poem, he lists all the reasons why he loves his partner, or as he puts it, "the reasons why our marriage might work." And the genius of

the poem is the level of detail it contains. One after another, he lists the particular and goes to great pains to be precise.

Have you ever written your own "Mountain Dew" poem?

Pick someone precious in your life and make an exceedingly specific list of the reasons why you treasure them. Don't stress about the poetic structure or try to make it perfect. Just sit down and make a list. When you are done, give it to your loved one. Or, better yet, read it out loud to them!

Deepening: A Contemplative Practice **Experiment**

There's lots of advice out there about how to cultivate relationships, but what about the challenge of deciding which relationships to nourish?

We live in a society that narrows our view, that distracts us from the relationships that matter most, and certainly Relationships require comment, at least from the relationships that could feed us the most. When societal voices encourage connection with our chequebooks, retirement accounts, social standing, and our Netflix cue, it's hard to hear an inner voice calling us to reconnect with wonder, stillness, play, protest, memory or prayer.


> This month lean into the work of noticing, of stepping back to widen your view, of listening to the longings for deeper connection.

Here's an exercise fro support your work:

- Set aside 15-30 minutes of reflection/ meditation to read this poem/prayer

multiple times by Phyllis Cole-Dai: https://www.dailygood.org/story/2540/ a-pandemic-poemprayer-phyllis-coledai/

- On the first reading, pay attention to the 4 or 5 lines that "pop" for you, that pull at your
- heart, or that that emotionally light up.
- Go slowly and notice the way the poem invites you to consider some types of relationship we might overlook. For instance, our relationship with our voice, our sense of safety, our faith, our temper, our expectations or what tempts us.
- Then reflect on those 4 or 5 lines and identify the one that stands out the most —The aim is to uncover the relationship that wants and most needs your attention right now, the relationship that wants you to feed it so it can feed you.

- as a flyer for the community to find out for a project where they fill them with


